## Transcript illustrating the handling of disagreement among focus group participants

- J in the States, the PhD programme incorporates a battery of writing courses. They're compulsory, I believe.
- PL hm? It does?
- J yeah, they just retrain you with the skills you need. I don't know if that's good or bad in the context of the UK system.
- PL oh that's a cultural issue again. In Poland for instance I wouldn't be given such courses because it's assumed I know how to write, that I've already learned what I need and that the only thing that they can help me with is with specific issues, at least.
- J all right but on the issue of plagiarism that's not really a writing issue.
- PL well it is as well. It's a writing issue, wouldn't you say? If you tend to copy certain things from without sometimes realizing it. It is a writing issue.
- J oh OK, if you say so. But those guidelines are universal.
- PL well true. But there are some differences I think with regards the way people approach this and sometimes I think England tends to be stricter about it.
- J but the same in the States.
- PL OK, let's leave the issue of plagiarism aside.
